### Hello / Hi

Swahili: Jambo

Used in formal or neutral situations.

### How are you?

Swahili: Habari

Responses: Nzuri, Salama, Nzuri sana

### Good Morning

Swahili: Habari za asubuhi

### Good Afternoon

Swahili: Habari za mchana

### Good Evening

Swahili: Habari za jioni

### Respectful Greeting (Elders)

Swahili: Shikamoo

Response: Marhaba

## Example Conversation

- 1 Person A: Habari
- 2 Person B: Nzuri, na wewe?
- 3 Person A: Nzuri sana

## Cultural Tip

In Swahili culture, greetings can be longer than in many other cultures. It is common to ask about family, work, and health to show care and respect.
